A letter from the president

Coal and supplies came in on the railroads, and milk went out. Our economy depended on the railroad. More specifically, our life's blood traveled along these railroads.

But now that we have a railroad society, what are we going to do? Are we going to sit around and talk about the "good old days" of the railroads? Yes, we must talk, because we must remember where we came from and we must preserve this memory. And no, we most definitely must not sit around, but rather col-

lect, record, and assemble as much we can of our railroad's history and whatever artifacts remain. And we must make it available and interesting to the general populace of the area.

My dream is to acquire and preserve railroad structures at the very center of this complex—in New Berlin, Edmeston, and South Edmeston; to acquire access to the right-ofway between these locations; and one day run vintage railroad rolling stock on tourist runs from and to these places. Deep down, I don't think I am alone in this dream.

Some people have said, "You're dreaming the impossible. We could never afford to lay that much track." But I say we cannot afford not to dream this big. Remember—and this has been proven—you will never grow greater than your dreams. It may happen that you fall short of a dream, but without your dream you will not even reach for your goal. We have already begun. We have a building in New Berlin (albeit more a liability than an asset as it now stands) and we are negotiating for a prime one in Edmeston. Let us keep the ball rolling.
