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



This note was received in December of 2009 and upon receiving his many years renewals I wonder if I acknowledged it then??

\*\*Henry Sommers, a true Train-rail enthusiast writes your editor several times a month with the most interesting invites to go with him on his *RidewithmeHenry* trips. All trips are very reasonable and sound so interesting. This month I received a long e-mail from him with the following article. Thinking you might find this interesting. "Ever know of a location you were at once in the far distant past but never thought you'd ever find it again? Such was the case with me....an impression in my

early youth days ..... was of a New York City trolley line on a private right of way under an elevated train structure crossing a street; the family was driving through the area. Well, this past Wednesday's RidewithmeHenry trip revealed the location somewhat by accident...I say by accident because the location was so obscure in my mind I never thought I would find it. But thanks to John Garcia for joining us on the trip and suggesting we get off the subway property at Fresh Pond Road on the M train line for lunch I found just the spot I thought I would never find...under the M train structure was an overgrown field to the south and a MTA bus garage to the north. You can't say the right of way was abandoned because the M train uses it, but the ground level portion has not been used in decades...but this was the place I remember seeing years ago. I remember having rode the Myrtle Ave. open air cars before the Myrtle Ave. line was dismantled south from the BMT junction but don't know in which direction we might have ridden it...so I consider Wednesday's ride to Metropolitan Ave, my first ride on the line. But a line I do remember riding 60+ years ago was to Canarsie when the two tracks stub ended in a park line setting unlike the scene we encountered Wednesday on today's L train. A change at Broadway Jct. to the A train took us to both ends of the Rockaway Peninsula to review the lingering results of Sandy's stormy visit a year ago. Boarding of 1074 almost five minutes late and arriving Hoboken almost 10 late to the five minute notice to board #6651 and a late departure at NYP followed by a run 5 minutes behind schedule through Denville and further delay entering Dover. Then train 1009 was held east of Dover until after a late 6653 was run around him from Denville and our arrival back at Lake Hopatcong was almost 15 minutes behind schedule. It was a strange delay at Dover. As railfans, occasional riders, we probably minded it less than commuters. It was an extraordinarily good railfan day of finding memories of the past and experiencing railroading of today for Ridewithme-Henry riders and we will have more adventures planned for the near future...hope you can join us soon. 


