### **Membership Restructure**

One of the problems that has plagued our organization for a number of years has been a lack of funds. A quick look at our membership types and fees provides one clue as to why. Back in April, when this first came up, we had 72 members including 43 Life members, 22 Individual members and 7 Family members. Individual members pay dues of \$20 per year and Family members pay \$30, but Life members pay no annual membership fee. The counts above provide only \$650 in membership income for the year. Our largest bill is insurance at \$1200 per year, so it is no wonder that we never have any money.

One thought was that some people who could afford to do so might pay more for membership if we asked them to. A proposal was brought forth, and approved by the board, to expand the categories of membership, as follows:

Brakeman, \$20 per year Fireman, \$50 per year

Engineer, \$100 per year Conductor, \$250 per year

Family memberships will be folded into the above structure, with an additional cost of \$5 per additional family member, per year. A family member is defined as someone living within the same household and does not receive separate mailings.

For Life members, the board agreed to continue existing life memberships at no required annual membership cost, but to not allow any new life memberships. In addition, Life members will now be encouraged to renew each year in one of the above categories.

Each year we will publish a list of names of all of members and the category of each. There will be an option of not being listed if you so choose. Beyond that, there are no other additional benefits to any membership category. It is simply a way for members who can afford to help us more than the minimum to do so and get a little recognition for that additional help.

Another change: for new members joining after July 1st, the membership dues will cover all of the following calendar year. This has often been the practice in the past, but now it is written down.

A letter will be going out in early January to everyone on the membership list asking you to renew your membership under one of the new categories. Thank you in advance for renewing your membership promptly.

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### **Up and Down the Tracks**

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
- \*\*\* Thanks to Alan Fairbrother for hosting the annual UV Christmas Party on Saturday, December 16th at his home. A good time was had by all.

#### Preservation Prevails Over Multi-Use Trail

The Adirondack Scenic Railroad got some good news at the end of September when a Supreme Court judge overturned the state's decision to tear up a 34-mile section of track between Lake Placid and Tupper Lake. The state wanted to turn it into a multi-use trail for recreational use including snowmobiling, hiking and biking.

The Adirondack Rail Preservation Society, which operates tourist trains under the Adirondack Scenic Railroad name, sued the state in April 2016. The lawsuit stemmed from a plan by the DEC and DOT, and approved by the APA, that would have removed 34 miles of train tracks between Lake Placid and Tupper Lake and replaced them with a multi-use trail.

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## A Brief History of the UV

The first organizational meeting of what became the UV Railroad was held on November 4, 1886, in West Edmeston, New York. After much organizing and fund-raising, construction began in May of 1889 to build a 20-mile long short-line railroad to connect the Delaware, Lackawanna & Western (DL&W) Railroad in Bridgewater to the New York, Ontario & Western (O&W) Railroad in New Berlin. The UV opened with a grand celebration in July of 1895 and immediately started hauling passengers and freight with a focus on agricultural

In 1904, Dr. Lewis Morris took control of the railroad through foreclosure and remained the owner until his death in 1936.

raw materials and finished products.

In 1938, the Morris estate sold the railroad to the H. E. Salzberg Company in New York City, a company best known for buying and scrapping small railroads. Everyone breathed a sigh of relief when they decided to actually run the railroad instead of scrapping it.

In 1941, the Salzbergs more than doubled the trackage of the UV overnight from 20 to 49 miles by buying the "New Berlin Branch" of the O&W from Edmeston to New Berlin to New Berlin Junction.

The UV then went on a slow decline as automobiles and trucks took to the road and impacted its passenger and milk hauling business as much that it could be less

In 1957, the last milk plant on the line closed. In 1960, the UV did also. The track was pulled up and the Unadilla Valley Railroad came to an end.

Newsletter — We're always looking for articles to publish in our quarterly newsletter. If you like to write about train-related topics, have been on a train ride or have done some railroad research, this could be your outlet. Be a writer.

Product Sales — Product sales are done at the museum itself when the museum is open, through the web site as well as traveling to regional toy and model train shows. The UV Storekeeper can always use help at the museum, and with transport, setting up, staffing, packing up and transport to/from a train show.

Social — We could use help with refreshments at meetings, with planning a few social activities or planning a special train ride somewhere. Be part of the fun.

# A Brief History of The Unadilla Valley Railway Society

While the decision to close the Unadilla Valley Railroad was a business decision by its owner, the H. E. Salzberg Company, and it took only a few weeks in 1960 to completely shut down the railroad, pull up the track and dispose of its rolling stock, buildings and right of way, the nostalgia for the railroad continues to this day.

What began as the dream of five local men, George Wolfangle, William Fliedner, Carl Carpenter, Michael Schowe and Jeff Utter, became a reality when the Unadilla Valley Railway Society & Museum was formed in 1995. Since that time the group has grown to over 70 members who work to preserve the heritage of the UV and other local railroads. Volunteers preserve, restore, research and interpret the collection for visitors.

The interests of the society include all aspects of the railroads that affected central New York's growth and development. The society and museum promotes research into the history of railroading and preserves many records of the Unadilla Valley Railroad history. The museum contains exhibits that provide visitors with a visual record of the evolution of railroad technology. These exhibits highlight the unique and distinctive features of our area's railroad history. The museum also interprets the economic and social impact of the railroads on the growth and evolution of this area in agriculture, industry and commerce.

Members are involved in fund-raising efforts through grant writing, the sale of books and pamphlets, clothing and railroad-related material. We also take the UV Store 'on the road' to local model train shows to raise funds and promote awareness of the UVRS&M.





### The Unadilla Valley Railroad in Rockdale

Rockdale is a hamlet on NY-8 about 2½ miles north of the blinker in East Guilford. Rockdale was the first stop on the New Berlin branch north from the junction with the O&W in East Guilford (aka New Berlin Junction).

It appears that Rockdale never was very big. But it was big enough to have a church, a hotel, a one-room school (at least until central schools came along), a creamery and a store. When the New York & Oswego Midland Railroad built the New Berlin Branch in 1869, the decision was made to make Rockdale a stop on the railroad line. It didn't generate

much business for the railroad so the station was closed in 1935. I have not been able to determine if the depot was still there when the UV bought the branch from the O&W in 1941. It's gone now.

There was precious little space between the Rockdale Hotel and the Unadilla River, but that is where the mainline, a couple of sidings and the depot were built. Presumably the feed store and milk plant were already there and the railroad was built around them.

The center picture is the Rockdale Hotel in 2013 in better times when it was open.

Nothing remains of the railroad, feed store, milk plant, ice house or depot. The area behind the Rockdale Hotel is now overgrown with brush. The Hotel itself has been closed for a number of years. (Submitted by Tom DeForest).
